The Musical Learning Tree

A Musical Learning Tree

is for the children to keep track of their learning.

It might be on the wall or in their own music book.

Use a silhouette of a tree with lots of branches.

It needs at least 6 roots for Music Dimensions.

Pulse/Beat & Tempo Duration & Rhythm

Pitch Dynamics Texture Timbre



Keeping track of your musical learning


 What will you add to the branches of your learning tree today?

The roots are for the key elements or dimensions of music Pulse Duration* Pitch Timbre Texture Dynamics



Duration is the actual element ie. the length of the note

Rhythm is the pattern of long and short notes Tempo affects the pulse



Foundation Stage learning Tree


At the end of the music session talk about which songs and rhymes the children remember from the lesson and decide where to add them to their Learning Tree.

Discuss which instruments were used. You may want separate branches for tapping / shaking / scraping instruments depending on the learning focus.

The roots of the tree are for Music Dimensions (Music Elements & Comparatives)

Pulse (Beat) Rhythm Pitch Dynamics Tempo Phrase etc. (Timbre Texture)
